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Party with Reno Oldest Living Mountain Lion in Captivity to Celebrate 20th Birthday at The Living Desert

his month, you have the opportunity to party with a real animal. On June 10, Reno, the oldest living mountain lion in captivity and one of the most beloved animals at the Living Desert Zoo and Gardens, will celebrate his 20th birthday with a grand party.

The Living Desert in Palm Desert is a 1,200 acre private, non-profit zoological park and botanical garden.

The day's activities include special birthday presents for Reno filled with his favorite treats, birthday cake for visitors, chats with his keepers, face painting and a kid's activity corner. The party begins at 10am in Eagle Canyon and the event is free with zoo admission.

The 20-year-old cougar, born in 1985, arrived at The Living Desert on June 8, 1993 from the California Department of Fish and Game. He was raised in Colorado by humans but when he moved to California, Reno was transferred to the care of Fish and Game. The Living Desert acquired him as part of their Eagle Canyon exhibit.

In September of 1993, Sedona, the zoo's female mountain lion, was introduced to Reno. Normally

cougars live a solitary life except during breeding season. Reno and Sedona were separated in 1994 but reintroduced in 2000. They have been together during ever since but separated at night, each with a turn in evening exhibits.

Mountain lions, cougars, pumas or catamount, another common name, occupy less than one-quarter of its once expansive range stretching from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from British Columbia to the tip of South America. They are now extinct in the eastern United States except for a few in Florida. Mountain lions can live up to 18 years. Reno's popularity is due in part to his people-friendly attitude. Zoo officials say he loves to lounge in front of the large glass windows, having his picture taken and watching visitors with his big beautiful eyes.

Getting to the beach in style

After 10 Years the Beach Train is now SummerLink with Expanded Service

t's been 10 years since the first Inland Empire families loaded sand buckets, shovels, boogie boards, and beach towels on the Beach Train and arrived relaxed and happy in San Clemente after cruising past traffic to their summer getaway.

In recognition of the Beach Train's popularity, the service-operated until now by the Riverside County Transportation Commission-has officially become part of Metrolink and will debut in July as SummerLink.

"The change means the service is a fixture of Metrolink now," RCTC rail program manager Stephanie Wiggins said. "This means more options for everyone who travels between Orange County and the Inland Empire whether it's for a fun day at the beach, to get to work, or to visit family and friends."

Joining the regular Metrolink family

will mean that Beach Train regulars will enjoy a number of conveniences that used to be available only to regular Metrolink passengers. Tickets will now be sold the day of travel at the ticket machines on the platforms, instead of through advance purchase ticket outlets. "This just adds so much more flexibility for everyone," Wiggins said. "Riders no longer need to make advance reservations and mail a check to reserve their tickets. Instead all they need to do is show up at the station and use our ticket vending machines on the day they ride."

Other changes relate to the fares and schedules-schedules will be posted on both the RCTC and Metrolink websites-as will fares. "It's become more like regular Metrolink service with station to station fares," Wiggins said.

Fares will run from \$11 for the shortest distances to \$16.75 round trip for

the longest distances. Regular discounts of 25 percent off Metrolink offers for seniors and persons with disabilities will also be available for the first time. There will be more trains, too with three round trips each day. For the first time, the schedule will also allow for reverse trips so that people can travel from Orange County to the Inland Empire in the morning and return in the evening.

In addition to having more trains each day, the SummerLink Trains will be offered on many more days. Service will operate every Saturday and Sunday from July 16 to October 9, except Labor Day Weekend September 3-4.

feature live entertainment, cruising, food and vendors. DJ personality Vic Slick will serve as the master of ceremonies.




The Center offers a kid-friendly approach to learning about nature. Sniff a Jeffrey pine tree and and discover where maple syrup comes from. Search for




woodpecker homes or just search for wildflowers and animal tracks.






and arts and crafts vendors along with sheepherding shows, Irish horse shows, Irish dog shows and one of the largest Irish Step Dancing competitions in California.

Action hero weekend

Convention puts military action figures with live counterparts

he annual A Weekend of Heroes Action Figure Convention/Military and Law Enforcement Recruitment display is entering its 4th year over the weekend of June 24-26, at the Ontario Convention Center.

A Weekend of Heroes began as a funfilled venue for military action figure collectors to meet the real heroes of yesteryears. Over the past three years, the convention has grown from its modest hotel ballroom size show to the currently 46,000 sqft facility. Today's AWH is no longer merely a waterhole for military action figure collectors but a gathering place for youngsters to learn about military history and meet the men and women who served our nation from World War II to Vietnam to current conflicts.

AWH 2005 will feature two modern heroes from Operation Anaconda, Afghanistan in 2002, and a WWII German paratrooper whose lifelong dream was to shake the hands of a 101st ABN paratrooper who jumped and fought in Normandy. According to the German paratrooper, 101st ABN soldiers were the best he'd ever fought against. There will be action figures made of all honorees.

AWH 2005 will add a Friday afternoon combat re-enactment in honor of Capt. Self, late PJ Cunningham, and those who lost their lives during the battle of Taku Ghar. A twinpack action figure set will be created in the honor of both heroes.

The Saturday night battle is AWH's trademark tribute to WWII veterans. The 2005 battle, Defense of Berlin, will feature a former German paratrooper who fought from Normandy to Berlin, including the fierce battle at Seelow Height, the final stand with the Russian Red Army before Berlin fell. Sgt. Gunther Meyer's story tells the fighting spirit of a young paratrooper.

The Legacy of Lewis

In an age rife with ethical scandals and widely differing views on just what can be relied upon as true, not to mention beautiful, more than 600 Americans will soon be "crossing the pond" to England to attend Oxbridge 2005, the sixth triennial C.S. Lewis Summer Institute to be held in Oxford and Cambridge from July 24 through August 6.

Organized by the C.S. Lewis Foundation of Oxford, England and Redlands, California, this year's two-week conference, entitled "Making All Things New: The Good, the True and the Beautiful in the 21st Century," marks the sixth such international conference to be held since its inception in 1988. Set in the medieval university cities of Oxford and Cambridge, Oxbridge 2005 will feature presentations by leading scholars and artists, representing many Christian traditions and interests from around the world including those of the arts, humanities, sciences and social sciences, and interlaced with music, dance, theater and worship.

"This is a particularly timely theme in which we consider the current social and intellectual trends of the Third Millennium," Stan Mattson, Ph.D., founder and president of the C.S. Lewis Foundation, said. "In one of his lesser known books, The Abolition of Man, Lewis warned that our culture was in imminent danger of abandoning the essential foundation of its core values, without which it could not long endure. The social and intellectual trends that followed Lewis' insightful and prophetic warning offer genuine cause for deep concern and serious reflection."

"Yet Lewis was far from a pessimist about the future," Mattson said, "and it will be in the spirit of Lewis' constructive critique that we will explore the possibilities of 'making all things new' across a wide spectrum of human experience in these our troubled times."

Attendees may attend one or both weeks, with an average of 80 percent of past attendees electing to attend both weeks, which is a prerequisite for auditioning to participate in the Choral Institute, directed by Dr. John Dickson of Texas Tech University.

During the summer, the chairlift speed is reduced to allow plenty of time to take in the natural beauty of Big Bear Valley and the surrounding San Bernardino National Forest. The Sky Chair ride takes about 15 minutes to transport cross-country mountain bikers, hikers and sightseers from the base elevation of 7,000 feet to the summit elevation at 8,200 feet.

At the top of the mountain, guests find the View Haus, home to Big Bear's most scenic eatery to enjoy a full lunch, a snack or a cold beverage while taking in the spectacular views of San Gorgonio, Southern California's highest mountain peak. Sightseers complete the adventure with the relaxing ride down to the base area.

For hikers and cross-country cyclists, the descent is extraordinary: wildflowers, spectacular views and, according to their preferences, challenging or easy trails.

The Scenic Sky Chair helps mountain bikers and hikers because it does most of the uphill climbing. Also, it leads them to Skyline Ridge (2N10), one of the most scenic trails in Big Bear Valley. The two favorite loops on the 2N10 ridge are Grand View Loop and Plantation Trail, both rated intermediate. Grand View's riding time is approximately 2 hours, and Plantation Trail is 3 hours.

Snow Summit no longer transports downhill-specific mountain bikes on the Scenic Sky Chair during the summer months for either recreational or competitive purposes. The resort continues to haul conventional (crosscountry) mountain bikes for the general public on the Sky Chair with access to off-site Forest Service trails and roads. Bikes must weigh less than 35 lbs., the tire size designation must be less than 2.5 lbs., front shocks must have less then 6 inches of travel and bikes must have three chain rings unless they are single speed.

Snow Summit will continue to host a number of cross-country mountain bike races and events throughout the summer, including the Snow Summit Amateur Cup Series, Women's Only Weekend, and 12-Hours at the Summit. The Scenic Sky Chair remains open until the winter season begins. The Sky Chair is open weekends only until June 18, after which it is open daily. After Labor Day, September 5, the Sky Chair returns to a "weekends only" status.

Scenic Sky Chair ticket prices for a oneway trip with bike are \$10 adults (ages 13 and up) and \$5 children (ages 7-12). A oneway trip without bike are \$7 adults and \$4 children. Roundtrips without bikes are \$10 adults and \$5 children.







The arcade is available for any kind of party, in-doors or out. They bring their own generator for outdoor events.



Theatre lives on through the passion of its 'players'

In 1925, Janet Scott and 26 of her friends elected officers and became charter members of the organization that has come to be known as Riverside Community Players. Currently in its 80th consecutive season, Riverside Community Players is one of the oldest continously operating community theatres in the United States.


While some older theatres had to close their doors during hard times, Riverside

Community Players continued to produce plays each season even during depressions and wars. During World War II, RCP members would go out to March Field and recruit soldiers to perform in the plays and even provide them with transportation to and from the

theatre for rehearsals and performances. The saying "the show must go on" was taken very seriously by those dedicated members of Riverside Community Players.

Without a permanent home, productions were done on various stages around Riverside - at the Riverside Women's Club, the Loring Bulding, Central Junior High School and Washington School at 12th and Almond.

In 1929 the Washington School was leased to Riverside Community Players and fundraising efforts got underway for its conversion into a theatre. For about 24 years the bulding at 12th and Almond was

Nachill Riot - Classroot, CA arrow home, but then the school district needed a place for a new administration building and a new home needed to be found. It was then that the lease arrangements were made for the land on Fourteenth Street between Magnolia and Brockton Avenues.

Fundraising efforts began again, and in September of 1953 the newly built theatre at 4026 Fourteenth Street opened its doors. A true labor of love, much of the interior of the facility was quite literally built by many of the members themselves, with donations in kind from friends and businesses in the community.

The cost of the original building was \$17,500. Later additions provided dressing rooms, the green room and a work/storage area called the Lewis Room in honor of the then Mayor of Riverside who was a very active member, and president, of Riverside Community Players.

The theatre bulding belonged to Riverside Community Players, but the land itslef was leased from the City at the cost of one dollar per year. The lease was intended to be renewed in perpetuity and the agreement was made on a handshake. However, over the years, and after an assortment of landswaps, the land came to be owned by Riverside Community Hospital and in 1989, Riverside Community Players was notified that when the lease was up in 1993, it would not be renewed.

Riverside Community Players then did what it had never done before and hired its first full-time paid employee. The ensuing years were filled by a lot of hard work, a few false starts and a lot of anxiety. A substantial amount of money was raised, but not nearly enough to purchase and renovate a building or purchase a large enough piece of land and build a new theatre. Finally, a few dedicated and determined people came to the rescue and Riverside Community Hospital was persuaded to sell the land on which the theatre sat to Riverside Community Players.

In October of 1995, 70 years after the organizationwas created, Riverside Community Players had a permanent home. Who says perserverance doesn't pay!

Having been able to pay cash for the property due to the generosity of its many patrons and members, Riverside Community Players remains debt free and continues to provide quality theatre to the community every season.


