hen Enoch Parrish planted his first apple tree in the foothills of San Bernardino in 1860 I'm sure he never envisioned that legions of families would someday flock to the Glen to enjoy sunshine and, of course, apples.

Big Bear Lake Oktoberfest celebrates 35 years

he Big Bear Lake Oktoberfest will celebrate 35 years of German style good times this year. As one of Southern California's longest running, family-operated events, this year's festival will offer visitors new entertainment, special contests and games and expanded dates. The weekend will include hundreds of street rods, customs, and muscle cars as well as the Reunion Swap Meet, Manufacturers Midway and lots of celebrities.







Got mule?

The 48th Annual Twenty Mule Team Day in Boron will be held Saturday, Oct. I, beginning with a parade at 10am followed by live music, game booths, displays and food booths.

The parade will be held on Twenty Mule Team Road, with other activities at the Kern County Community Park, located south of the railroad tracks at the corner of Boron Avenue and John Street.

As the history of mining towns go, the unincorporated town of Boron is young. The rich borax deposit was discovered in the 1920s and developed in the early 1930s. The borax wagons, pulled by 20 mules, were used to haul borax from the Harmony Borax Works in Death Valley to the railroad in Mojave. Pacific Coast Borax Co., now U.S. Borax or Borax Global, used the 20 mule team and wagons to promote the sale of borax by touring and appearing in parades throughout the United States.



The Wild West

Calico Ghost town celebrates 'Days'



he dusty days of the wild west lives again during Calico Days, a festival with a great deal of its own history.

Thirty-nine years ago Calico Days began. Its purpose was to celebrate Calico Ghost Town's Wild West past and the discovery of silver ore in 1881.

Today, Calico Days is rough and ready as always. The celebration runs October 7, 8 and 9 in the tiny ghost town just north of Barstow. Some of the many events include a steak fry and costume contest Friday evening. Saturday features an 1880's costume parade at high noon followed by an evening under the stars with a BBQ and

dance with music by the Johnny James Band. On Sunday watch a wild burro race followed by the National Gunfight Stunt Exhibition.

In addition, egg tossin', frying pan toss and bucket brigade contests are among some of the many events designed to transport participants back in time to Calico's "Glory Days." All contests are free to enter and offer prizes and ribbons to the winners.

In town, the old mingles with the modern and visitors can find cowboy hats and old-time photos next to hamburgers and french fries. Enjoy the experience as they did back when, with a tour around town on horseback. Wooden plank sidewalks line Main Street, which is paved, and many employees dress circa 1881.

At the north end of town teepees surround a broom swept dance area. Story telling and Native American cultural displays provide a back drop to lively tunes by Border Radio. Then on Sunday at high noon enjoy rock wrestling, the first of three trials during the Miners Triathlon takes place.

The Palm Springs Tram: Adventure throughout the year

Think of the desert and pictures of swimming pools and golf courses come to mind. But adventure? For that you can take the 10-minute, 2.5-mile Palm Springs Aerial Tramway ride which begins at the Valley Station, elevation 2,643 feet, and ends at the Mountain

Station, elevation 8,516 feet, and is the gateway to the Mount San Jacinto State Park and Wilderness area.

The top of the Tramway is transformed into a pristine snow-covered playground during the winter.Visitors can try their hand at cross-country skiing or snowshoeing. Enthusiasts have found the area to be unsurpassed in its challenging trails. Didn't bring your own? During the summer months, when it is well into the 100s in the desert, the mountains offer more than 54 miles of hiking trails, camping and guided nature walks as a pleasant alternative to chilling out. It's nearly 40 degrees cooler at the top.

Trails range from the awe-inspiring 512-mile trek to the peak of San Jacinto (at 10,834 it is the second tallest mountain in southern Californla) to the one-mile nature walk through picturesque Long Valley, located just behind the Mountain Station. Campsites are located throughout the State Park. Wilderness permits are required for any hiking or backpacking and may be obtained from the Ranger



Station located in Long Valley.

For those who are environmentally oriented, the Mount San Jacinto State Park Volunteers conducts free-guided nature walks each weekend during the summer. The Natural History Museum,

> located on the lower level, offers maps and nature books for a fee. At the Mountain Station enjoy viewpoints, cocktail lounge, gift shop, Natural History Museum and two documentary style movies about the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway and the Mount San Jacinto State Park.

Dine at one of the two restaurants. Elevations Restaurant offers fine dining, while the Top of the Tram Restaurant offers an affordable cafeteria-style alternative.

The first Tram up Monday through Friday leaves at 10am, Saturday and Sunday 8am. The last Tram up is 8pm and the last Tram down 9:45pm. Tram admission is \$21.50 for adults and \$14.50 for children ages 3-12 years. Discounted Twilight Tickets are available for purchase from 3pm. Cost of the Twilight Tickets

are \$18.50 for adults and seniors and \$11.50 for children ages 3-12. Ride In' Dine tickets are available from 3pm and include Tram admission and dinner at Top of the Tram Restaurant. Each year the festival includes a cultural sidebar. This year's will showcase German language films. "In the spirit of showcasing German language films, the festival will also have an 'Octoberfest' theme to its Saturday night Wrap Party," Eric Lewis, the festival treasurer and party event planner, said. "We are excited about going into our sixth year and we continue to grow as a film festival," festival president Gail M. McCarthy said.

"The film festival's rapid growth and inclusion of many film categories has brought exposure to a wide range of independent feature films, student films, short films, documentaries, family films, animated films and digital films, many of which went on to win other prizes, including Academy Award nominations and Independent Spirit Award nominations," artistic & programming director Monika Skerbelis said.

In addition to a successful screenwriting competition, the festival hosts an annual screenwriting/filmmaker panel discussion with many of the film industry jurors in attendance. These jurors help make the festival valuable to new film-

mines in the world. The mine is also known for the high quality turquoise mined in conjunction with the copper.

Lee and Arvid spent as much time as possible dealing in coins, especially at flea markets. Wayne happened to pick up a selection of Navajo Indian woven saddle blankets and sent them to Tucson where Lee and Arvid, in turn, sold them at flea markets. They were highly successful and the brothers were off and running.

Trips to the Navajo Reservation began where they bought Navajo weavings wholesale from trading posts.

As the inventory grew Lee began putting on shows with other dealers and individuals and soon it was shows that had nothing but vendors and artisans of Indian arts and crafts. By the mid 1970s their inventory became large enough and varied enough to put on shows with their own inventory.

By the early 1990s shows had been conducted in numerous states from coast to coast. Hopi potters included many of the Nampeyo family, the Feather woman family and the Frog Woman family plus many more potters from other pueblos. Artists, the living legend, Harrison Begay, Beatien Yazz, Calvin and Irving Toddy-Yazz's sons and the late Robert Draper. Robert Redbird Sr. the very noted Kiowa artist came in and established a long term relationship. Jewelers, the multi-award winniner Al Nez, the fantastic micro-inay jewelers Carl and Irene Clark, Bruce Hodgins of many talents as well as awards. The list goes on through kachina carvers, Navajo rug weavers sand painters, and many other "art" forms.




